


WAYNE TOWNSHIP Welcome to our Fall Edition

TOLBERTROAD CLOSING

The Butler County Engineer's Office reports that Tolbert Road will close today between Wayne Milford Road and Waynes Trace Road for an emergency repair on the bridge over Ninemile Creek. A recent bridge inspection revealed more structural deterioration than anticipated and requires an emergency road closure. The road will remain closed to all through traffic (including EMS) throughout the winter while design and funding options are explored for the repair. Construction is expected to begin in the spring of 2020.

DETOUR: Eastbound Tolbert Road traffic will detour south on Wayne Milford Road, east on U.S. 127, and north on Waynes Trace Road. Westbound traffic will reverse this route.

Our fiscal office, Laura Daley, has done a wonderful job nearing the completion of her fourth year. The finances of the township are in good shape and she runs a fiscally tight ship. Because of her efforts, we have more flexibility to afford things we could not in the past. For example, we were able this year to provide medical insurance to our three full time employees. Not only does this help them and their family but it also provides an avenue to retain good people and reduce turnover. Thanks Laura and we look forward to having you as our fiscal office for many years to come.

In essence, we have a good team from top to bottom. Everyone works well together to achieve a common goal which is to provide the best possible services to our residents equally and fairly to all. We have continued to open up our now bimonthly Trustee meetings so that all residents can participate and speak about current issues or whatever topics they feel need to be addressed. We encourage all to come to the meetings and get involved in the business end of our township and participate. Our meetings are held on the first and third Monday of each month unless those days fall on a holiday.

For those in Heavenly Acres, we are close to having approved drawings. As of the writing of this letter, the final revised plans have been turned in to the County for review and also we should be obtaining a financial estimate for the work to be done. Prices for jobs of this type this year have been bid well above expected costs so we will work with the County to put this out for bid toward the end of the year or whatever time we can get the best value for the money spent.

For the first time, Wayne Township has partnered with the MidPointe Library System (Middletown, Trenton, Monroe and West Chester) gaining what is basically a 24 hour kiosk called a "Smart Locker". As a library member, you can go onto the MidPointe system and order up anything they have that is of sufficient size and have it delivered to our new Smart Locker. You will be notified by phone or email when your order has arrived and you come and pick it up. The smart locker is located in the hallway of the Township Building and the hallway is now open 24 hours a day. Also, you can use this as a drop-off location to return anything back to the library instead of going to a local branch. If you have any questions, call the Trenton library branch at 513-988-9050.

I have been privileged to work with President Mike Truster, Trustee Ed Truster and our entire staff. We are closing in on our second year together as Trustees trying our best to work within the law and doing what we believe is the best for our residents with no prejudice. It is hard to believe that fall is already upon us.

Our Road Crew has had a busy summer this year with ditching projects, road and cemetery mowing, replacing



two retaining walls in the ditch along mill road (this project turned out great!) and maintaining our equipment. It is a rare time that we have to send any of our equipment to a dealer or shop to have repairs made, Johnny Cassidy has taken up the role of chief mechanic and makes a lot of things happen, keeping our equipment running and rarely missing a beat. The three of them; Daniel Hoit, Austin Young and Johnny Cassidy have meshed well this year and work together like a well-oiled machine. They all have seemed to find their niche and are taking on projects and responsibilities in their own area and 'making it happen'. I am proud of the crew we have and their effort and dedication to their job.

The Fire Department and Life Squad have had a busier than normal year, with runs in both fire and squad departments well above monthly and yearly averages. The new fire truck is on order and the Fire Department is working with the manufacturer as needed to see its progress along. The dedication and devotion that the members of our Fire Department and Life Squad have to their community and fellow residents is remarkable. Words cannot describe the thanks and gratitude that we as a community owe them for their service and efforts.

It was recently brought to our attention that Tolbert Road will be closed between Wayne's Trace Road and Wayne Milford Road for an extended period of time do to the deteriorated condition of the bridge. The Butler County Engineers Office closed the road after a routine bridge inspection found reason to close the bridge. We are being told that it will be well into next spring before any repairs to the bridge are made.

We continue to make progress (albeit very slow at times) on the Heavenly Acres drainage project. There were some unexpected delays with the Butler County Engineers Office and design work on this project this summer, and we are currently awaiting the Engineer's Estimate on construction cost for the project. We are looking to get this project out to bid this fall / winter. Our concern is that since the grant was awarded several years ago and construction costs have risen

sharply since that time; that we are unsure what the actual cost to Wayne Township will be.

We are continuing to look at paving roads, and maintaining our roads in the best manner possible in the meanwhile. Our goal is to get back to actual asphalt paving, as we have not seen good results with the recent chip seal type paving that we have had done, nor is it a 'popular' type of road pavement among residents. We have received some quotes for asphalt paving this year that are favorable to our budget and come from a vendor who uses 'virgin' asphalt. Virgin asphalt is made of all new materials and does not contain recycled asphalt materials, and results in a better finished product that lasts longer. The O.R.C. (Ohio Revised Code) dictates what size projects must be let to public bid or if they can be awarded by quote. We are working to get everything in line to possibly start this process. However, this discussion of paving has been somewhat hampered by the realization that the Heavenly Acres project could likely cost more than anticipated. We will have many decisions to work through in the near future regarding these issues. We have made a priority to preserve the roads and pavement that we have as best as possible and have in place a time line to have all roads crack sealed in the next two years. Granted there will be spots and areas that will need revisited thereafter, but crack sealing our roads is one of the best measures possible to maintain the pavement we have. It is not a cheap process, but the cost is well worth the gain.

O.D.O.T. was able to get the culvert under Cotton Run Road just north of State Route 744 changed this summer, it was a bit later in the year than they had planned as they were delayed due to the wet spring we had. It is still in our plans to see what can be done with getting the water on Cotton Run Rd north of State Route 744 on the east side of Cotton Run Road to drain better.

Cincinnati Bell is partnering with Butler Rural Electric Cooperative in the effort of bringing high speed internet their (Butler Rural's) service area. I am hopeful that this partnership will help to aid in the need of high speed internet providers in our township and beyond. Wayne Township also has partnered with MidPointe library to have a drop box locker at our Township hall. You can order books, videos, and more online and have them delivered to the Township Hall in Jacksonburg. You can also return library items at this location. For more information contact the MidPointe Library.

I would also like to note that as of September 9th, 2019 the Board of Trustees has settled all ongoing litigation involving Wayne Township and zoning. Since before I took

ONTHEROAD

This summer has been an interesting one for sure. Going from rain, to drought to more rain, sure has put a weird twist on our mowing schedule. Our Road mowers have completed four rounds of



mowing and we will try to squeeze one more in before the end of the season.

On top of mowing the road crew has completed many more projects this past season. One of the largest projects was building new headwalls on Mill Road. Replacing the old cinderblock walls with poured concrete walls and riprap. The Road crew also completed 8 miles of crack sealing to help preserve our roads. We have also completed a few thousand feet of ditching throughout the Township.

PLEASE REMEMBER TO SLOW DOWN WHEN PASSING OUR CREWS WHILE IN A WORK ZONE.

As we prep for winter, Wayne Township will be receiving our salt from Cargill for the 2019-2020 season. The contract for this year is \$73.21 per ton, which is up from \$62.98 from 2018-2019 contract. Please remember to give our snow plows room to operate and if you have any issues with Roads or mailboxes on a township maintained road, please let us know.

In other Township news, Ohio Department of Transportation is currently in process of acquiring Right-of-Way for Jacksonburg/73 Roundabout. ODOT reps said the plans will be filed in February 2020 and construction beginning in the summer of 2020. They anticipate Jacksonburg Road being closed for 1 year.

Please remember to slow down when passing our crews while in a work zone. I hope everyone has a great Fall and safe Winter! \mathbb{W}



An improperly connected generator can cause bodily harm to power company workers, or damage to your generator and home, and if operated to close to your home could cause affixation from carbon monoxide gasses entering your home.

CHIEF'SBRIFFS

Summer has come and gone and fall is here. Our volunteers have been busy this past spring and summer with automobile accidents, fire alarms and fighting fires. Your volunteers are truly



committed and dedicated to keeping all or our residents safe. We have placed the order for our new fire engine and we are all looking forward to its arrival in the early months of 2020.

On Sunday, November 4th at 2:00 am, time will change again as we fall back an hour. So, once again, it's time to check and/or change the batteries in your smoke detectors and carbon monoxide detectors. Don't forget to your fire extinguishers too. Make sure the "gauge is in the green." If it's in the red it doesn't work and needs to be replaced.

As the warm summer days fade into cold chilly nights, you need to prepare your house with the following safety tips:

CHECK ALL SAFETY DEVICES

- ☐ Clean out gutters by removing debris and leaves. If you burn leaves, do it away from the house and make sure it is in the proper containers.
- ☐ Fire safety check your chimney and make sure it is free of debris and proper ventilation. Use a fireplace screen to keep sparks from flying everywhere. By cleaning the lint out of your dryer vent after every use will prevent dryer fires. Never leave a load of laundry unattended or candles burning when you leave your house.
- ☐ Fire up the furnace turn your heater on before the temperatures get too cold to ensure that it works. Keep all flammable materials away from the furnace.
- ☐ Inspect the insulation check your house for cold drafts to keep the cold air out by improving the insulation in your attic and walls. This will also keep your energy bills down so your

furnace doesn't have to work harder keeping the house warmer. ☐ Trim the trees – by removing dead branches and limbs on your property. This will also help when it snows or if we

have heavy winds to keep them from falling on your house or vehicles.

FALL DRIVING SAFETY TIPS

- ☐ Black ice be aware of areas where black ice forms on the roadway.
- ☐ Farm machinery will be back in the fields so they have to use the roadway just like you. Take your time and don't pass unless the road is clear.
- ☐ Fog will limit your visibility when driving. Keep your lights on low beam. This setting keeps the light beam down towards the road.
- ☐ **Frost** as the temperatures drop over the nighttime hours, frost often forms on the roadway. Drive slowly and break gently on bridges and overpasses because these frost quicker than other roadway surfaces.
- ☐ Leaves fall everywhere and can make roads slippery by obscuring vision of traffic lines, pavement and even potholes.
- ☐ People be aware of children playing outside or riding their bikes. People are walking their dogs, running or walking.
- Rain when water is on top of dust and oil, the pavement becomes very slippery.
- ☐ School watch out for buses in the early mornings or late afternoons. Parents and children will also be crosswalks. Teenager's will also be arriving and leaving school meaning more traffic on the roads.
- ☐ Wildlife watch out for wildlife in the rural areas. Please don't swerve if a deer runs out in front of you. Always drive defensively.

There is something about the winter months and curling up with a good book by the fireplace. But did you know that heating equipment is one of the leading causes of home fire deaths? With a few simple safety tips and precautions you can prevent most heating fires from happening.

BE WARM AND SAFE THIS WINTER!

- Keep anything that can burn at least three-feet (one metre) away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- R!
- Have a three-foot (one metre) "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer's instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month.

Heating Equipment Smarts

Install wood burning stoves following manufacturer's instructions or have a professional do the installation. All fuel-burning equipment should be vented to the outside to avoid carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning.

Install and maintain CO alarms to avoid the risk of CO poisoning. If you smell gas in your gas heater, do not light the appliance. Leave the home immediately and call your local fire department or gas company.

Half of home heating fires are reported during the months of **December**, **January**, and **February**.
