CALL TO ORDER

Trustee Bill Jones called the meeting to order at 7:00pm.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

All stood for the pledge of allegiance.

ROLL CALL

F.O. Laura Daley took roll call; Trustee Ed Truster was absent. Bill Jones made a motion to excuse Ed Truster from the December 19th meeting, followed by a second motion from Tim Taylor. Roll call was taken; 2 ayes, 0 nays, 1 absent.

MOMENT OF SILENCE

ST. CLAIR TOWNSHIP TRUSTEE; TOM BARNES. PASSED AWAY ON DEC. 9, 2022.

AUDIENCE OF PUBLIC

Nancy Jungkunz -4061 Hamilton Eaton road stated that on August 30th her husband experienced a rectal bleed, after calling 911, it took 35 minutes for a squad to arrive to transport him. She stated luckily it was due to colitis and not something more.. He was hospitalized and after a few days released after. After being home for a few days, he suffered from a slight heart attack. This time she chose not to call for a squad and to transport him herself due to the amount of time it took for the squad to arrive last time. She stated I live within a mile of Seven Mile and would choose to have Seven Mile service her area due to the time it takes for St. Clair to arrive compared to Seven Mile. She stated she did not understand what the issue may be between Seven Mile's fire Department and Wayne Township's department but it needs to be addressed, as she questioned if the delay could have been avoided. She asked how much a life is worth. Trustee Bill Jones responded by stating that Wayne Township decided to open the contract for bid two years' ago due to the fact that our squad is certified Advanced Life Support and Seven Mile is only certified Basic Life support. The Trustees felt it very necessary to offer all the resident's in the township the same care and the same ability to treat patients in these emergency situations. It had nothing to do with who offered the care as long as the same ability to treat in a timely manner. He sympathized with her regarding the amount of time it took for the squad to arrive and stated the trustees are actively looking into the issue. Squad Captain also explained the difference between ALS certified and BLS certified and stated that the only reasons we went with St. Clair Township with the contract is that they hold certifications and unlike ourselves and Seven Mile, which are strictly volunteer departments, St. Claire is a full-time department and are always staffed. She explained that they will pull the actual call and investigate the time it took as they have been having issues with how calls are being dispatched.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

November 21, 2022, Regular Meeting

A motion to approve the November 21st meeting minutes was made by Tim Taylor, followed by a second by Bill Jones. Roll call was taken; 2 ayes, 0 nays, 1 absent.

PRESENTATIONS

Missy O'Brian – Ohio means Jobs- did not show, a brief explanation of what she planned to present was given by Bill Jones, stating Ohio means Jobs is a resource to help place people with employment giving resources to the individuals and businesses alike.

Energy Alliance – creates the ability to put energy rates out to bid for Duke customers. Energy alliance handles all aspects, then giving customers the option to opt out if they are unhappy with the service. This item is something that would have to go to the voter's and the cost of placing this on the ballot would fall on the Township. 

- Look for best value at start of program




Draft Timeline for Aggregation Program

- Submit aggregation issue(s) for ballot.
- Election Day
- 30 Days Post Election: Develop Plan of Operation and Governance(s)
- 60 90 Days Post Election:
- Holds 2 public hearings (per commodity) to discuss/revise the Plan
- Community Adopts the Plan of Operation and Governance
- Aggregation application submitted to PUCO (30-day approval period)
- 3 4 Months Post Election: Energy Alliances obtains bids & recommends a
- 4 − 5 Months Post Election:
- The supplier notifies eligible residents about the program and gives them 21 days to decide if they want to participate
- 0 At the end of the 21-day notification period, supplier submits enrollments, and the program goes into effect Energy Alliances
